1990 to 1999: Strengthening North-South Relations


2000 to Present: Construction of a Learning Network for Social Change



#### HORIZONS APPROACH TO DEVELOPMENT

Horizons and our partners believe that <u>our role is not to replace functions incumbent on States.</u>

Rather, our work is aimed at strengthening the capacity of marginalized peoples in the South -- in particular women -- so that they can more effectively press their governments to respect their international human rights obligations.

According to various UN studies the region has among the highest levels of social inequities in the world.



### MURDERS OF WOMEN IN CENTRAL AMERICAN COUNTRIES WITH HIGHEST RATES (2000-2006)



### FEMICIDE IN CENTRAL AMERICA AND MEXICO

- In El Salvador, between 2006 and 2006 murder rate of men rose by 40%, but murder rate of women rose by 111%
- In Guatemala, between 1990 and 2004 killing of men doubled, but the killing of women tripled
- In Honduras, between 2003 and 2007 the murder rate of women increase 4 times that of men



#### HORIZONS APPROACH TO GENDER EQUALITY

- In 1992 after a regional meeting with partners decided that Horizons needed to develop its own institutional gender policy
- Since that time gender work has been integrated throughout organization and how we work with partners
  - Policy of prioritizing projects that focus on women's needs and require all projects to identify whether and how gender will be addressed
  - Provide capacity building to partner organizations including ongoing training and education to partner staff and beneficiaries on concepts of gender
  - Support the development and implementation of institutional gender policies, as well as specific work methodologies








### THEMATIC WORK ON VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND FEMICIDE
